

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INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this report is to identify relevant legislation in the 111th U.S. Congress pertaining to U.S.-Korea relations and the Korean-American community. Where possible, the report also tracks votes and positions of congressional members regarding such legislation. The report does not take a position on members' voting behavior nor assesses the merits of relevant legislation.

Relevant legislation can be grouped into four main categories. First is nonproliferation and defense/security issues related to North Korea. Most congressional activity concerns this area. Second is North Korean human rights and freedom of information. Third is a range of military and defense issues related to the U.S.-ROK alliance and the U.S. military presence in South Korea. Fourth, a few pieces of legislation reflect narrow and discreet items of interest to the Korean-American community.

METHODOLOGY

Relevant legislation includes all congressional actions that expressly mention "Korea." The report also attempted to identify legislation of indirect interest to U.S.-Korea relations or the Korean-American community that does not explicitly mention "Korea." This includes legislation related to the following concerns: visa waiver program; defense relations with major non-NATO allies; US forward-deployed forces; free trade agreements; non-proliferation; and human rights. Given the difficulty of inferring or imputing any legislative priorities to the Korean-American community, the relevant legislation listed below cannot claim to be an exhaustive list nor can it be used to make any assessment regarding the role or impact of Korean-Americans on the U.S. legislative process.¹

FINDINGS

Below is an itemized list of relevant legislation in each house of Congress distinguished by type: bill,² joint resolution,³ concurrent resolution,⁴ resolution;⁵ and amendments to introduced

² A bill is the form used for most legislation, whether permanent or temporary, general or special, public or private.

³ Joint resolutions may originate either in the House of Representatives or in the Senate—not, as is sometimes incorrectly assumed, jointly in both Houses. There is little practical difference between a bill and a joint resolution and the two forms are often used interchangeably.

⁴ A matter affecting the operations of both Houses of Congress is usually initiated by a concurrent resolution. Concurrent and simple resolutions normally are not legislative in character—they are not "presented" to the President for approval—and so are used merely for expressing facts, principles, opinions, and purposes of the two Houses. A concurrent resolution is not equivalent to a bill.

legislation. Entries for each piece of legislation summarize relevance to Korean issues, identify the member who introduced the legislation and if possible any co-sponsors,⁶ and provide a status update of the latest congressional action as of October 2009.

Following each description is a breakdown of congressional members' votes for each piece of legislation. Members who introduced legislation are marked (I) and co-sponsors (C). Members voting in favor receive (+) while those voting against receive (-). Members who did not vote are noted (NV).

SENATE

Bills

S.837: North Korea Sanctions Act of 2009

This bill was introduced by Senator Sam Brownback (R-KS) with 7 co-sponsors on April 20, 2009. The bill corresponds to legislation introduced in the House as H.R. 3423 (see below). The bill directs the Secretary of State to re-designate North Korea as a state sponsor of terrorism under the Export Administration Act of 1979, the Arms Control Export Act, and the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961. Moreover, the bill expresses the sense of the Congress that the Special Envoy for Human Rights in North Korea should be present at all negotiating sessions between the governments of the United States and North Korea. The bill has not been presented for a vote and is currently pending before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

S.1407: Military Construction and Veteran's Affairs and Related Agencies Appropriations Act of 2010

Senator Tim Johnson (D-SD) introduced this bill on July 7, 2009. It authorizes facility construction and maintenance funds for the Department of Defense for fiscal year 2010. For countries hosting U.S. forces, the bill requires the Departments of Defense and State to report on U.S. efforts to encourage greater “burden sharing” with host countries, including South Korea. This includes, *inter alia*, encouraging host countries to increase defense expenditure and provide U.S. forces with in-kind contributions for military construction projects. The bill has not been presented for a vote and is currently pending before the Senate Appropriations Committee.

S.1416 North Korea Accountability Act of 2009

This bill was introduced by Senator Sam Brownback (R-KS) and three co-sponsors on July 8, 2009. The bill seeks to direct U.S. policy toward North Korea in a number of areas, establishes requirements for various government reports to Congress concerning North Korea, and authorizes relevant appropriations in support of such policy measures. First, the Act directs the Secretary of State to re-designate North Korea as a state sponsor of terrorism. Second, it directs the Secretary of the Treasury to prohibit U.S. financial institutions from engaging in transactions with a foreign bank that is itself involved in a financial transaction with the North Korean government or any North Korean official. Third, it seeks to deepen military cooperation with Japan and South Korea, specifically through joint military training and U.S. sales of advanced military technology to Japan (Aegis radar systems; Patriot Advanced Capability-3 and Terminal High Altitude Area Defense missile defense systems, and a variant of the F-22 advanced tactical fighter). Fourth, it establishes reporting requirements regarding the implementation of, *inter alia*:

the North Korean Human Rights Act of 2004; any financial transactions or trade with North Korea; North Korea's nuclear weapons program; and the resettlement of North Korean refugees in the United States. Fifth, it authorizes appropriations and allows re-allocation of funds for: the completion of missile defense systems in Alaska to protect against long-range North Korean missiles; the expansion of radio broadcasting into North Korea; and relevant State Department programs in support of North Korean human rights. The bill has not been presented for a vote and is currently pending before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

S.1434: Department of State, Foreign Operations, and Related Programs Appropriations Act of 2010

This bill, introduced by Senator Patrick Leahy (D-VT) on July 7, 2009, makes appropriations for the Department of State, all foreign operations, and related programs for fiscal year 2010. This is the Senate counterpart to H.R.3081 (see below). The Act makes funds available for assisting the resettlement of North Korean refugees in the US and supporting international radio broadcasts into North Korea (\$7.8 million). The Act expressly prohibits bilateral economic assistance, international security assistance, multilateral assistance, and export and investment assistance to Cuba, North Korea, Iran, and Syria. The bill has passed through the Senate Appropriations Committee and is currently on the legislative calendar awaiting floor consideration.

Amendments

S.AMDT.1597 to S.1390

Senator Sam Brownback (R-KS) with 4 co-sponsors submitted an amendment on July 16, 2009 to a bill authorizing fiscal year 2010 appropriations for the Department of Defense. The amendment expressed the sense of the Senate that the Secretary of State should re-designate North Korea as a state sponsor of terrorism. The amendment failed by Yea-Nay vote of 43-54.

Senators supporting the amendment will be noted with a (+) while those opposing will be marked with (-).

S.AMDT.1761 to S.1390

Senator John Kerry (D-MA) with 3 co-sponsors proposed an amendment on July 22, 2009 to a bill authorizing fiscal year 2010 appropriations for the Department of Defense. The amendment expressed the sense of the Senate that the US should fully enforce existing sanctions—and should explore additional sanctions—against North Korea and that a review should be conducted to determine whether North Korea should be re-designated by the US government as a state sponsor of terrorism. The amendment passed with the Senate with a Yea-Nay vote of 66-31. Senators supporting the amendment will be noted with a (+) while those opposing will be marked with (-).

Bills

H.R.485: STOP Act of 2009

The Security through Termination of Proliferation Act—STOP Act of 2009—was introduced by Representative Ileana Ros-Lehtinen (R-FL) on January 13, 2009. The Act requires the maintenance of U.S. sanctions on Iran, North Korea, and Syria until the President certifies to the relevant congressional committees that such countries have verifiably dismantled WMD programs. STOP 2009 amends the Iran, North Korea and Syria Nonproliferation Act (Public Law 106-178; 50 U.S.C. 1701) to cover persons involved in the transshipment of identified WMD-relevant goods, services, and technologies to/from Iran, North Korea, or Syria. The act also encourages U.S. restrictions on nuclear cooperation with third-countries that are assisting Iranian, North Korean, or Syrian nuclear or conventional missile programs. Under this act, the U.S. can also exclude from the U.S. any senior government official of Iran, North Korea, or Syria involved in proliferation activities. STOP 2009 has not been presented for a vote and is currently pending before the relevant committees: Foreign Affairs; Ways and Means; Judiciary (subcommittee on Immigration, Citizenship, Refugees, Border Security, and International Law); Oversight and Government Reform; Financial Services.

H.R.1208: Iran Threat Reduction Act of 2009

A bill introduced by Representative Ileana Ros-Lehtinen (R-FL) on February 26, 2009, with 120 co-sponsors. This bill mostly pertains to the maintenance of sanctions on Iran, but also amends the Iran, North Korea, Syria Nonproliferation Act (Public Law 106-178; 50 U.S.C. 1701) to extend its provisions to certain persons involved in the transshipment of identified goods, services, or technologies to those three countries. The Act has not been presented for a vote and is currently pending before relevant House committees: Foreign Affairs; Financial Services; Oversight and Government Reform; Ways and Means; Judiciary; Education and Labor; and Science and Technology.

H.R.1980: North Korea Sanctions and Diplomatic Non-recognition Act of 2009

Representative Ileana Ros-Lehtinen (R-FL) introduced the North Korea Sanctions and Diplomatic Nonrecognition Act of 2009 with 22 co-sponsors on April 21, 2009. The Act provides for the maintenance of diplomatic, military, and economic sanctions on North Korea until the President certifies to Congress that the North Korean government: 1) is no longer engaged in the illicit transfer of missile or nuclear technology, particularly to Iran and Syria; 2) is not assisting foreign terrorist organizations; 3) is no longer counterfeiting U.S. currency; 4) is no longer engaged in illicit narcotics traffic; 5) has released identified U.S. citizens, Japanese nationals, and surviving Korean War POWs; 6) has undertaken specific actions related to Korean family reunions; and 7) has implemented specific penal reforms. Diplomatic non-recognition continues as long as such benchmarks remain unmet. The Act has not been presented for a vote and is currently pending in the House Foreign Affairs committee.

H.R.2290: International Uranium Extraction and Milling Control Act of 2009

Representative Brad Sherman (D-CA) introduced the International Uranium Extraction and Milling Control Act of 2009 with 2 co-sponsors on May 6, 2009. The Act requires the U.S. to oppose the transfer to Iran, North Korea, and Syria of goods, services, or technology used to extract uranium ore and to work with other countries to impose international restrictions on such transfers. The Act also amends the Iran, North Korea, and Syria Nonproliferation Act (Public Law 106-178; 50 U.S.C. 1701) to require the President to notify Congress of every foreign national who transferred to Iran, North Korea, or Syria any goods, services, or technology relevant to uranium ore extraction. The Act has not been presented for a vote and is currently pending in the House Foreign Affairs committee.

H.R.2632: The Korean War Veterans Recognition Act

The Korean War Veterans Recognition Act, introduced by Representative Charles Rangel (D-NY) on May 21, 2009 with 60 co-sponsors, became public law on July 27, 2009. The Act amends title 4 of the U.S. Code to designate July 27 as National Korean War Veterans Armistice Day and to encourage the display of the U.S. flag on that day. The Act passed in the House by a vote of 421-0 and by unanimous consent in the Senate.

H.R.2845: Protect the Homeland from North Korean and Iranian Ballistic Missiles Act

Representative Trent Franks (R-AZ) introduced the Protect the Homeland from North Korean and Iranian Ballistic Missiles Act on June 26, 2009 with 9 co-sponsors. Citing the threat of North

Korean and Iranian long-range ballistic missiles and the proliferation of such technology, the Act directs the Secretary of Defense to deploy specified numbers of ground-based interceptors in Alaska (at least 40), California (at least 4), and in other appropriate locations as designated by the President. The Act authorizes funding in the amount of \$500 million for the ground-based midcourse defense system of the Missile Defense Agency. The bill has not been presented for a vote and is currently pending in the House Foreign Affairs Committee and the House Armed Services Committee (Subcommittee on Strategic Forces).

H.R.3081: Department of State, Foreign Operations, and Related Programs Appropriations Act, 2010

This bill, introduced by Representative Nita Lowey (D-NY) on June 26, 2009, authorizes appropriations for the Department of State, USAID, all foreign operations, and related programs for fiscal year 2010. Various sections are relevant for Korea. The Act makes funds available for assisting the resettlement of North Korean refugees in the US and supporting international radio broadcasts into North Korea (\$7.8 million). The Act expressly prohibits bilateral economic assistance, international security assistance, multilateral assistance, and export and investment assistance to Cuba, North Korea, Iran, and Syria. The Act passed the House on July 9, 2009 by a Yea-Nay vote of 318-106. Representatives supporting the amendment will be noted with a (+) while those opposing will be marked with (-).

H.R.3107: Stop Nuclear Assistance to State Sponsors of Terrorism Act of 2009

Representative Ileana Ros-Lehtinen (R-FL) with 9 co-sponsors introduced the Stop Nuclear Assistance to State Sponsors of Terrorism Act of 2009 on June 26, 2009. The Act prohibits U.S. contributions to the International Atomic Energy Agency from being used to support IAEA nuclear assistance, through its Technical Cooperation Program, to any country, including North Korea: 1) that is a state sponsor of terrorism; and 2) in breach or noncompliance, or under investigation for breach or noncompliance, with obligations to the IAEA, NPT, UN charter, or relevant UN resolutions. The Act directs the Secretary of State to withhold specified voluntary and assessed contributions to the IAEA that support activities in such countries, and requires the U.S. representative to the IAEA to block the allocation of international funds to such countries. The Act has not been presented for a vote and is currently pending before the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

H.R.3423: North Korea Sanctions Act of 2009

Representative Michael McMahon (D-NY) introduced the Act with one co-sponsor on July 30, 2009. In response to North Korea's nuclear test on May 25, 2009, the Act requires the application of US sanctions on North Korea as defined in the U.S. Arms Export Control Act. The Act provides an option to waive the application of sanctions if the President certifies in writing to Congress that such activities would be detrimental to U.S. national security, seriously prejudicial to the achievement of U.S. nonproliferation goals, or have adverse effects on other vital U.S. interests. The Act has not been presented for a vote and is currently pending in the House Foreign Affairs and House Financial Services committees.

Concurrent Resolutions

H.CON.RES.136

Introduced by Representative Diane Watson (D-CA) and 22 co-sponsors on May 21, 2009, the purpose of the resolution is to authorize the use of Capital Grounds for a celebration of Citizenship Day (September 17), a commemorative holiday honoring the U.S. Constitution and those holding U.S. citizenship. This resolution permits the National Korean American Service and Education Consortium to sponsor a free public event on the Capital Grounds on Citizenship Day. The resolution passed the House on September 9, 2009 on a voice vote (through motion to suspend rules) and is currently pending before the Senate Committee on Rules and Administration.

Recognizing the vital role of the Proliferation Security Initiative in preventing the spread of WMD, the resolution congratulates South Korea for its decision to participate in PSI, recommends that the US President deepen international cooperation to prevent the proliferation of WMD, and urges non-PSI countries, specifically China, to fully cooperate with PSI member nations. The resolution has not been agreed to in the House and is currently pending before the House Foreign Affairs Committee.
